# Spotlight on: Patti Owens

Disclaimer, I already know Patti, probably closer than anyone else on the board just because she is the eChapter secretary and we share a lot of information each month, but that's one aspect of knowing someone in a specific context. She has been active in eChapter for many years serving on committees and as officer and board member. I found as I dug a little deeper that once again, as exemplified in the past three interviews, I found myself in the midst of a nursing legend. I hope you enjoy this interview as much as I did.

Patti is a force. She has always wanted to be a nurse and envisioned helping people through their suffering and directing them to better outcomes. She had no idea that being a nurse would lead her to the career she has now.

She graduated from the University of Colorado-Denver, with a BSN in 1976. Her first job landed her in Labor and Delivery. She recalled she enjoyed this rotation in school, so she accepted it. She got married and as a newly wed and a new grad, you find that some of the hospital shift rotations did not always make for the most conducive relationship building. As a result, she started looking for a position in the daylight.

They moved to Idaho for the purpose of her husband to complete his master's degree. The hospital she applied to was very small, and there was a day position open in the Operating Room so she accepted it. Due to the size of the hospital she learned to scrub, circulate, and provide post op care. This education proved invaluable to her.

They moved again to accommodate her husband's job in Washington state and due to Patti's experiences she was an easy fit for the OR position she applied for. It was during this time that medical lasers started to enter the OR. It was at that time that Patti found she was a Technology Geek. She truly liked the equipment and learning all about it. She became clinical educator after 2 years and created a program to credential doctors and staff. She worked directly with vendors, specialists, and staff to train laser operators and laser specialists. This led to per diem consulting with laser vendors and started joining in professional organizations to ensure safety and compliance by assisting in forming standards and operating policies for laser safety. As laser technology grew into the aesthetic worlds of plastics and dermatology, Patti evolved as well.

Mind you this work with laser was per diem. Patti was also maintaining her role as clinical educator (13 years), volunteering for various professional organizations, wife, and mother, and also working on her master's degree in healthcare administration. She had a view that she would be a great nursing administrator, but this was the 1990's and for those that remember that time, the hospitals were making this level of management do more with less, meaning that one manager may be assigned multiple departments to manage and some of those they may have little or no knowledge. She watched the stress in these managers increase exponentially and she did not relish a career like that. So, she left the hospital setting, after her first marriage ended, and directed her attention to aesthetic laser practices. In Washington state, RNs had authority to perform laser procedures in offices under

MD supervision. Her expertise and collaboration with other nurses and specialists nationally and internationally allowed for her to create policy, standards, and safety protocols for the masses.

Over the years she finally met her soulmate, remarried, and together they left the rainy Pacific NW escaping to the sunny California desert where she resides today and works for a large Plastic Surgery surgicenter and aesthetic clinic as the regulatory and compliance officer.

Patti has demonstrated through her career and volunteerism a sense of adventure. She pushes herself, and states sometimes she is her own worst critic. Not uncommon for a trailblazer. She has proven that you can utilize all your education in various settings, and when looking back you can see a pattern emerge that can serve new nurses in understanding that the nursing profession builds on phases, knowledge, experiences, and introductions. She shows that you have to look at every opportunity as a possible new adventure for you. It's important to note that Patti praises her mentors as Penny Smalley, Vangie Dennis, Kay Ball, and specific MDs (Brazil, Lazafame, and Sofonio), who have shown her the values of collaboration, consensus building, and respect. She also values her professional relationship with Bill Ertle, who provides consulting opportunities in teaching Medical Laser Safety Officer courses throughout the US. Collectively they have provided support, shared information generously, and empowered her.

She feels that her passion for patient, staff, and provider safety has driven her work and her career trajectory to become a content expert for AORN and other organizations to lead the way in laser safety initiatives worldwide. Her newest excitement is watching how research is becoming more translational to the bedside (bench to bedside). Her international exposure has provided opportunities to gain a more eclectic vision of safe practice and it has broadened her view of what is and what can be.

While some of the awards and accolades that Patti has garnered over the years, she has found that her spiritual health is as important as physical health or professional growth and uses her spiritual mentors to help her find peace and balance in such a busy life as she serves to improve safety efforts within her purview.
